Dear Readers

Wishing you all a very Happy Easter!

This year, the festival of Easter falls very early. Easter Sunday is 31st March, just 9 days after the earliest possible date it can be. I'm hoping for good weather so we're not standing outside for the dawn service on Easter morning in a blizzard!

At St Mary's Stanford that morning (whatever the weather) as the dawn chorus fills the air around, we will light a large candle from an outdoor fire and carry the light back into the church building. It's a wonderful moment when the candle is taken through the doors into the dark building and used to light many other hand held candles. Slowly the church is filled with a wonderful glow and we sing a joyful song. Easter has arrived.

By these actions, we symbolically take the light of Christ back into the church building where it was extinguished on a solemn Maundy Thursday. Easter Sunday's Communion bread will radiate out across our communities to services at a number of our other churches, including Eastham, Rochford and Stoke Bliss.

On the first Easter morning the scene which greeted the women who went to the garden tomb was not of light and hope. Where they expected to see a lifeless Jesus, they found a puzzling empty tomb. Each gospel writer gives us a different view on the women's reactions.

In Mark, the women are driven away by fear – and they say nothing ...

In Luke, the women return home and tell the apostles; Peter only believes them when he sees for himself ...

In Matthew, the women leave with a mixture of fear and joy. The earthquakes, lightning and quaking guards balanced by the great joy of meeting Jesus in the garden ...

Finally, John recounts an aching beautiful encounter between risen Jesus and Mary Magdalene.



The committee hopes to make improvements at the hall for the benefit of the whole community so it's once again a place worth visiting.



Abberley – from Eobold to the Grey Lady

For many of us, Abberley is a place we pass through on the way to Worcester or the motorway. But it's much more than just a road to somewhere else!

The clock tower is a familiar local landmark. 161 feet tall overlooking the Teme valley, it can be seen from six counties. It was built in 1884 by John Joseph Jones, a cotton magnate who owned Abberley Hall, as a time keeper for his farm workers ... or maybe to keep up with his aristocratic neighbours at Witley Court!

Abberley is mentioned in the Domesday Book as Eoboldsleigh, or Eobold's settlement. Eobold was the leader of a small group of Saxons who, late in the sixth century, took this tiny

clearing in the huge central forest of England from its native Britons, who had occupied it since prehistoric times, and built wooden huts and a mead hall. The village became part of the kingdom of Mercia and in the ninth century, when King Offa was baptised and Christianity was accepted by the kingdom, the first church was built in Abberley.

William the Conqueror granted the manor of Abberley to Ralph de Todeni, his standard bearer at the Battle of Hastings and one of his most powerful barons. The estate passed through many families before it was bought by Joseph Jones in



1867 and inherited by his cousin John Joseph Jones in 1880.

As well as building the clock tower, John Joseph set about massive improvements to the gardens, built a model farm and the Victorian estate cottages which are such a feature of the village, and extended the estates.

Abberley village nestles at the foot of Abberley Hill which dominates the surrounding countryside. On top of the hill, marked by an oak tree, the Apostles' Oak, is the spot where, according to the Venerable Bede, St Augustine met the Welsh and Irish bishops in 602 in an abortive attempt to arrange a uniform celebration of Easter.

In the middle of the village is the

Manor Arms, a delightful country pub. The front of the 300 year-old building, originally owned by the Lord of the Manor, is decorated with the coats of arms of many local families including the Norman de Todeni family. And the ghost of the Grey Lady walks in the lane outside!

So the next time you whizz through Abberley on the way to somewhere else, think about all the many people who have been there before you and made it so much more interesting than you had ever imagined!





Hot cross bun and butter pudding

If you like classic bread and butter pudding, you'll love this twist that uses hot cross buns instead – a great way to use up any Easter leftovers

Prep 20 minutes Cook 50 minutes Serves 8

Ingredients

300ml pot double cream 600ml milk 4 eggs 100g golden caster sugar 1 ½ tsp vanilla essence 8 hot cross buns 40g soft butter 100g marzipan, cubed 3 tbsp chunky marmalade icing sugar, for dusting

Method

Heat oven to 170C/150C fan/gas 3. Warm the cream and milk in a pan over a gentle heat. Whisk the eggs, sugar and vanilla together with a fork in a large bowl, then gradually add the warm cream mixture

Halve the buns and spread with the butter. Arrange in a large shallow ovenproof dish (approx 25 x 32cm), dot with the marzipan and brush the marmalade on top.

Pour over the cream mixture and set aside to soak for 15 mins. Press the buns down into the custard mixture as they soften.

Bake for 50 mins until set, then remove and allow to stand for 10 mins. Dust lightly with icing sugar and serve while still warm.

I realised too late that as I gave him larger, more elegant homes so he grew ever bigger and more beautiful ...

Cats too feature in this tale. One beautiful white Persian, beloved by all, once went walkabout for no apparent reason. Days later my brother was playing football at school, 20 miles away, when he glanced across the pitch and there was Oliver, a little skinny and in need of a bath but delighted to have tracked down his playmate.

His brother Twisty was a cheeky tabby who came for long walks with us and once jumped over a wall and down a waterfall. We ran, fearing the worst, and scrambled through the undergrowth beside the stream where we found a bedraggled, very wet and very angry cat.

We don't have a cat at present, just neighbours' cats visiting and oh, how I wish they wore collars with little bells. Dogs have to wear collars, why not cats? I would welcome them more warmly if they gave our precious garden birds a fighting chance.

Animals bring such joy to our lives. It is hell when they leave us but their memory and the shared fun times make it all worthwhile.

Climate change – an alternative approach

Recent issues of Teme Talk have had a series of articles on climate change. It has been helpful to be reminded of one of the most critical issues we face. But I would suggest a different response, a response based on hope rather than fear and guilt.

This planet we live on is an amazing place. It is stuffed full of abundant life. Even with the world's population as it is there are enough resources for everyone to have a good quality of

life without wrecking the world. So how can we live well with the resources that are available?

I would suggest that behaviour driven by fear isn't good for us or the planet. Fear of not having enough drives us to accumulate and hoard. Whether it's food in the fridge, clothes in the wardrobe or money in the bank, gathering more than we need just gives us more to worry about. So it doesn't actually do us any good and it harms the planet. At national level, fear leads to the destruction we have seen in the many wars that rage. From a Christian perspective it's worth remembering that the one command that Jesus repeated more frequently than any other to his followers was, "Do not be afraid".

Guilt may temporarily and begrudgingly persuade us to drive less, fly less or eat less meat (though the science behind that simplistic slogan is poor in the extreme) but isn't it better to travel as sustainably as possible, enjoy local holidays without spending hours cooped up in airports or

waiting at passport control and enjoy the rich diversity of a local seasonal diet (of the kind that Averil Opperman in *Tesco Rules*, in February's TemeTalk, laments that Tenbury Tesco doesn't stock).

We are fortunate in this country and particularly in the Teme Valley to have access to food that is nutritious, tasty and sustainable. If, as I hope we all do, we want our diets to have a positive impact on the environment, we can eat locally sourced, sustainably produced seasonal food. That may well mean a wonderfully tasty locally sourced bacon roll rather than air freighted smashed avocado on toast.

I think it was David Jenkins, a former bishop of Durham, who said that a society that has hope for the future invests in the future. May we have hope, so our behaviour today invests in the future.

Teme Valley Wildlife

"When gorse is in blossom, kissing's in season" runs an old saying, which is handy for would-be sweethearts because gorse flowers can be found in any month of the year from January to Novem-ber. Presumably the plant takes a break in December when it can hand over the job to



mistletoe for Christmas. Unromantic botanists point out that the long flowering season of gorse is due to most colonies being a mixture of two varieties; common gorse which flowers from January to June and western gorse which takes over between July and November.

We are all familiar with the spiky green gorse bush, also known as furze or whin, which opens into a sea of bright yellow flowers and has a pleasant coconutty scent. The pea-like flowers are apparently edible although I've never given one a try. Rather surprisingly, the plant was formerly used as animal feed and was first passed through a mill, sometimes a cider mill, to soften the stems and take the edge off the spines. In fact gorse was once a very useful plant and local laws controlled how much could be cut in order to keep it as a sustainable resource. Furze-cutting was often limited to what could be carried on a man's back and

some districts forbade the grubbing up of whole bushes.

The main use of gorse was as a fuel, although it was sometimes taken to be made into brooms and chimney brushes. Being highly flammable it provided a quick hot blaze which was good for getting a fire going on a cold morning. It also found favour in domestic bread ovens and was used to fire both brick kilns and lime kilns.

Despite being so flammable, gorse is well adapted to survive the natural fires encountered when growing in its usual heathland habitat. New

shoots can spring up directly from the roots and the seed pods crack open and are scattered by fire. In this way, patches of predominantly old bushes can be rejuvenated by deliberate firing.

Gorse flowers are attractive to many species of bee because they produce large amounts of pollen. A trigger mechanism is activated when a bee

pushes inside the flower, releasing a burst of pollen grains onto the insect's abdomen. This is useful to pollen-seeking bees but other pollinators are less likely to visit because the flowers offer very little nectar.

Other creatures to value gorse are birds who take advantage of the thorny protection afforded to their nests. Birds with a particular liking for the plant include stonechats, whinchats and yellowhammers. It is said that the call of the stonechat, often to be seen perching on top, is remarkably similar to the sound of a gorse seedpod cracking open. I wonder what lies at the heart of that coincidence; nature has so many secrets.
