# Dear Readers

'Continuity' – the fact of something continuing for a long period of time without being changed or stopped

With each passing year the seasons come and go and the church year continues the liturgical cycle. As I write it is New Year's eve 2024 and as you read, this event may well seem like quite a while ago.

In the church calendar we celebrated the birth of Jesus, then in January the arrival of the Magi or Wise Men and now on 2nd February it's Candlemas. Here we celebrate the presentation of the baby Jesus in the Temple and purification of his mother Mary.

This day marks the completion of forty days since his birth. Joseph and Mary bring the baby Jesus into the temple and there are two people who for many years have been awaiting this moment: a fragile old man named Simeon who acclaims the baby as 'the light to enlighten the nations' and with him the prophet Anna who proclaims Jesus as her Redeemer.

The festival of Candlemas is celebrated, of course, with lots of lighted candles. These lights signify that 'Jesus is the light shining in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it'. These words were announced forty days ago in the reading from John's gospel that was read at Christmas services in churches across the world.

At Candlemas, Anna takes on the role of evangelist, preaching to all the people of God that the Messiah has come to redeem the world. Simeon and Anna have seen salvation with their own eyes, they hand this salvation on to others, on to us, and this becomes our role too.

*'Continuity'* – here over 2000 years on we are called to share that light, to share the message of hope and salvation to all the world.





# Steamed sponge pudding with honey butterscotch sauce

If you're going to Pudding Night at Hanley Village Hall on 18th January, why not make this delicious steamed sponge pudding with honey butterscotch sauce – a real winter warmer!

### Ingredients

175g butter, softened, plus extra for greasing175g light muscovado sugar1 tbsp honey3 large free-range eggs175g self-raising flourIce cream, to serve

For the butterscotch sauce: 50g butter 100g light muscovado sugar 150g honey, plus extra to serve 150ml double cream

### Method

Generously grease a 1 litre/1¾ pint pudding basin with butter. Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Beat in the honey, then beat in the eggs, one at a time, adding a spoonful of flour with the last egg. Fold in the remaining flour. Cover the basin with a piece of greased foil, pleated in the centre, and tie in place with string.



Place in a steamer basket over a pan of boiling water, cover with the lid, and steam for 2 hours, topping up the pan with boiling water if needed.

To make the butterscotch sauce, place the butter, sugar and honey in a pan over a low heat, stirring until all the ingredients have melted and combined. Stir in the cream and keep warm.

To serve, remove the foil from the pudding basin and carefully run a knife around the edge of the basin to loosen the pudding. Cover with an inverted plate and turn out. Cut into wedges and serve with the honey butterscotch sauce, ice cream and more honey if you like.

# **Rochford's stained glass windows**

At the All Souls service in November, Rev'd Julia gave a fascinating sermon about the stained glass windows at Rochford church. Several people asked for a precis of the keypoints, so here they are.

The way we remember our loved ones is individual to each of us. We may have a favourite place or have their photo to hand or come to the side of somebody's grave and say a silent prayer or talk to them. As we look around Rochford church, the memory of particular individuals is through more permanent items such as stained glass.

At the back of the church

there is a striking stained-glass window from the studio of William Morris & Co in Westminster. It depicts St Michael the Archangel and is in memory of Selina, wife of WE Maund, a long-time worshipper here, who lived at Cold Green, or Coal Green as it was then.

On the left hand side of the nave is the window in memory of Warwick and Jennifer Gledhill's son Kieron Gledhill and the candle holder remembers their daughter Nicola. They both died so unexpectedly. The window to the left of the alter is a lovely springtime scene in memory of Hilda and Cliff Johnson, who were lifelong worshippers at Rochford church.

Above the altar is a window that depicts the nativity, an early William Morris design by Morris Marshall, Faulkner & Co. Research shows that the original watercolour drawing for it is in the Burne-Jones catalogue and held in a collection in San Marino, California. The two larger angels were indeed designed by William Morris and the middle panel and the angels at the top were designed by Edward Burne-Jones, who was very familiar with this area. He was from Birmingham but visited Shelsley Beauchamp, just along the Teme, on many occasions. The flower design on the panels also appears in glass in William Morris' family home, The Red House in Bexleyheath, where he lived between 1860 and 1865.

If you look carefully, this window also has an inscription running along the bottom which reads, "In memoriam Sarah Constantia Clark, obit 2nd



November 1863". But who on earth was Sarah Constantia Clark? She's not buried in Rochford churchyard but in a cemetery in London close to where William Morris's company offices were in Red Lion Square. She was born in Jamaica in 1835, baptised in 1862 in London, married in June 1863 to stockbroker Frederick Clark but sadly died on 2nd November 1863, just a few short months afterwards, at just 29 years old and is buried in Kensal Green Cemetery with her sister Agnes who died in 1881. So we find ourselves with a rather special memorial window and a bit of a mystery. We

know a bit about who Sarah was and we know a bit about the window itself but the connection we are currently missing is why is she remembered here in Rochford in this particular way. That's the thing about memory; we don't always need to know the whys and wherefores or even to be able to express and process all of our feelings to be able to respect and honour someone's life.

# **Teme Valley Wildlife**

Dear, oh deer! It had not been my intention to write about deer but a large female muntjac appeared in my garden and as muntjac are notorious for grazing all known garden plants, I took heed of her presence, in broad daylight, in front of my windows where she generally made herself conspicu-



ous and loitered for photographs, and decided it was wise to change my mind.

Muntjac are one of the six breeds of deer living in Britain today. They are not native and therefore arguably not a suitable subject for this article, but they are easily the most common deer to be seen in the Teme valley. Their numbers have increased over the last thirty years and I have noticed them particularly frequently since the pandemic lockdown. I have come across as many as three animals together, usually in the early morning or evening, and now see them during the daytime too. Last summer I watched a buck come across a sunny field towards me as I stood in the shade of some trees. He looked at me with some curiosity, coming forward with tentative steps, but them thought better of himself and dived into a thick bramble patch. This was the first time I had seen a muntjac head on, and I was struck by his very attractive striped face and neat short horns. Before that, my sight-

ings had always been from behind, where a sloping back and shortish rear legs prompted the thought, "what an odd-looking dog".

Muntjac are, indeed, dog size, about the same as a labrador, and hail originally from the subtropical forests of south-east Asia. More correctly they are known as Reeves' Muntjac, named after a John Reeves (1774-1856), once a tea inspector for the East India Company. The word muntjac originates from Indonesia, but Reeves saw his first specimens in China. They came to Britain in 1894, to grace the Duke of Bedford's deer park at Woburn, but soon escaped it and were first noted

in the wild in the 1920s. Despite Britain's climate being decidedly far from "sub-tropical", the little deer settled in well and now live across the whole of England, much of Wales and have recently reached Scotland.

Another name for the muntjac is "barking deer". This has arisen because of the very loud and rather distressing bark that the female emits when she is seeking a mate. The sound is a cross between a cough and a shriek and apparently is used shortly after a female has given birth. There is no breeding season as such, a female can produce a faun, usually just one, at any time of year. Their rich red-brown coat changes to a darker hue in the winter, which was indeed sported by my garden visitor who, my neighbours informed me, had been barking loudly in a nearby orchard a week or so before. The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7.30pm on Thursday 13th February at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall. We welcome Richard Gosling whose talk will describe how the RSPB goes about investigating crime against wild birds. Members and friends are all welcome, it is just £3 on the door.


