Dear Readers

Autumn has been a time of bringing in the harvest, a time of thanksgiving and, at last, gratitude for rain. October goes out in a blaze of glory as it makes way for approaching winter.

In our churches we celebrated harvest in the traditional way with gifts of food and produce and songs of praise and thanksgiving. In our villages we gathered for jolly harvest meals, raising funds for those who are not so blessed.

As the leaves began to fall and nature started its preparations for winter sleep so, at the Feast of All Souls, we remembered our loved ones who have been laid to rest. And at All Saints we rejoiced with all the company of heaven. In the misty half-light the boundaries between earth and heaven become blurred.



A strange day out

We were looking forward to our day out in London. As my husband is elderly, we were lucky enough to have someone to drive us there. I relished the thought of a little nap during the journey, but no chance. To my horror our driver was chatty. But in

no time I was completely absorbed.

He used to be a prison officer. He got on better with the inmates than with the prison officers, many of whom he disliked. "I had the same background as many of the inmates," he said. "Too many guards are middle class. As a child we all had our own buckets. There were chalk marks on the floor and whenever it rained we had to rush to our mark with our bucket to collect the water pouring from holes in the roof. When the building was condemned we were moved on."

His stories were mesmerising. Was he ever attacked, I asked. Not often. "But once I was checking through the Valentine's Day post. There was one large card with big velvety roses on it which I thought looked odd. Sure enough, the prisoners' supply of drugs for a week was inside the roses." He told us that sometimes drugs would pass from mouth to mouth in a visiting partner's kiss.

We arrived at the restaurant we had booked for lunch. Here another surprise awaited us. No booking! Next we visited Church's shoe shop on Jermyn Street so I could look for some longer laces for my husband's shoes. One of the lovely assistants looked at the number of eyes on my husband's shoes and disappeared. "Just as I thought," she smiled, triumphantly. "We have some. Let me fit them for you."

She recognised the shoes as old Church's shoes. "They need a decent polish", she said. "I did buff up the toes this morning," I said sheepishly. "I can see that," she grinned "but I think we can do better." Off came the shoes and she worked her magic. Fifteen minutes later, we walked out with smiles on our faces, my husband's shoes

looking like new and no charge. That's what I call old-fashioned service.

Later we set off in an Uber for the party. It was a 100th birthday celebration, our son's 60th and his wife's 40th. I gave the

The car was searched from top to bottom and underneath. The nervous young driver had his papers checked. Eventually we were let go but not before I had lowered my window and said in a haughty voice, "You've brought us the wrong way up a one-way street and we were only going around the corner." "No problem, madam," - and we were given a police escort to our hotel!

What a day! And what a blessing next morning to arrive safely back in Worcestershire!

Pumpkin pie



Fill a sweet shortcrust pastry tart case with lightly spiced squash to make a traditional American treat just right for Thanksgiving. Serves 8

Ingredients

750g/1lb 10oz pumpkin or butternut squash, peeled, deseeded and cut into chunks 350g/12oz sweet shortcrust pastry plain flour for dusting 140g/5oz caster sugar ½ tsp salt ½ tsp fresh nutmeg, grated 1 tsp cinnamon 2 eggs, beaten 25g/1oz butter, melted 175ml/6 fl oz milk

Method

1 tbsp icing sugar

Place the pumpkin in a large saucepan, cover with

water and bring to the boil. Cover with a lid and simmer for 15 minutes or until tender. Drain pumpkin and let cool.

Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured surface and use it to line a 22cm loose-bottomed tart tin. Chill for 15 minutes. Line the pastry with baking parchment and baking beans, then bake for 15 minutes. Remove the beans and paper and cook for a further 10 minutes until the base is pale golden and biscuity. Remove from the oven and allow to cool slightly.

Increase the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Push the cooled pumpkin through a sieve into a large bowl or blend to a puree in a food processor. In a separate bowl, combine the sugar, salt, nutmeg and half the cinnamon. Mix in the beaten eggs, melted butter and milk, then add to the pumpkin purée and stir to combine. Pour into the tart shell and cook for 10 minutes, then reduce the temperature to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Continue to bake for 35-40 minutes until the filling has just set.

Leave to cool, then remove the pie from the tin. Mix the remaining cinnamon with the icing sugar and dust over the pie. Serve chilled with cream.





Teme Valley Wildlife

Autumn is here, bringing a welcome end to the soaring temperatures of summer 2025. I took the opportunity of some cooler walking conditions to complete the Isbourne Way, a route which traces the River Isbourne from its source in the Cotswold Hills to the River Avon at Evesham, which I had begun to walk earlier in the year. As I bent down to pick up a bean my eye was caught by a small fossil lying on the soil surface. It was rather unexpected and proved to be a fossil which I recognised as the shell of a long-extinct oyster called Gryphaea. Walking along, I saw that

along to take advantage of such free food.





there were hundreds, possibly thousands, of these shells littering the field, a sight I had never come across before. I have always been excited by finding fossils and knew that a band of fossil-bearing limestone crossed Britain from Lyme Regis in Dorset to Whitby in Yorkshire. However, hadn't realised that crossed the south-east corner of Worcestershire. The ancient oysters lived in

warm shallow seas during the Jurassic period when Britain looked very different from the way it looks today.

The abundance of these fossils led to them receiving the common name of "devil's toenails" and in the past they were used as charms and in some parts of the country were thought to be able to ward off rheumatism. Here in Worcestershire, not far from the Malvern Hills, I thought of the opening to the medieval poem Piers Ploughman who looked down on "a fair field full of folk" and

The Piece Hall in Halifax

When our children gave us a short break away for our fiftieth wedding anniversary they thought we would go to the Lake District or Wales or somewhere with a nice cathedral – they know their father is partial to a nice cathedral. When we said we wanted to go to

Halifax they were astonished. Has Halifax got a nice cathedral? No, it hasn't got a cathedral at all.

What Halifax has got is the Piece Hall, the oldest remaining Georgian cloth hall in the world. It is absolutely stunning, a huge quadrangle surrounded by four colonnaded sides containing 315 small rooms which were used by traders to store their cloth.

It opened on New Year's Day in 1779 as a public market for the sale of "pieces" (a 30 yard length of fabric produced on a handloom) of woven woollen kersey cloth and cost about £9,000 to build, equivalent to over half a million pounds in today's money.

One of the most remarkable things about the Piece Hall is that it was only used for two hours a week for trading cloth, from 10am to 12 noon on Saturdays. The rest of the time it was locked.



But the Industrial Revolution, the introduction of powered machinery and the evolution of the factory system, caused the decline and eventual extinction of the small scale self-employed clothiers that used the Piece Hall for trade. By the early 1830s fewer than 200

rooms were occupied. As the weekly textile market declined, the building was used for a variety of social gatherings, eventually becoming a wholesale fish, fruit and vegetable market in 1871. It remained a wholesale market for almost a century.

Today this unique building is once again a bustling centre of activity with lots of small shops, cafés and restaurants as well as an art gallery and a museum.

So thank you to our children who gave us two nights at the charming and very comfortable Shibden Mill Inn just outside Halifax and the opportunity to visit this jaw-droppingly amazing place – and the chance to experience the roadworks which seem to completely fill the centre of Halifax and utterly confused us and our sat-nav!
