## Dear Readers

Already it is October, the season of Harvest Thanksgiving when the Teme Valley glows in the autumn sunshine. It is the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness when our senses are alive to the colour and shape of the trees, the heaving swell of hills and hummocks, the pattern of hedges and the movement of sheep across the landscape. We hear geese flying overhead and look up to see them flying southward in formation. Rain waters the earth. Seed is sown. We smell the rich earth, cool to the touch. Indoors some of us make chutney, bake cakes.

Not so well known are the celebrations for Francis of Assisi which take place at this time every year. 800 years ago the first Franciscans arrived on our shores just two years after his death. There has been a Franciscan house in Canterbury ever since. Today there are friaries and convents all over the world as well as a Third Order of men and women from all walks of life living at home within their own communities.

Francis was a rich young man, a soldier, the son of a wealthy merchant. But he was not a man of his time, he was a man for all times and most certainly a man for today. He discovered the love of God for all creation. He loved the unlovely, he found joy in the outcast. He renounced his wealth. As he walked the hills of Umbria he saw that all of creation is interconnected, all depend on each other. Brother sun and sister moon and the stars; water, wind and fire. Mother earth, fruits and flowers and all living creatures. Praise God for all these blessings and give thanks. Francis lived anew the creation songs of the psalms. Like Jesus he withdrew to the hills to pray, to spend time with God. He lived the life of Jesus in his own time. His prayer led to action. He was called to





#### Days out in south Herefordshire





## From your motoring correspondent ...

Just before Covid I reached my peak motoring ambition. I bought a Range Rover. This was slightly accidental – my elderly Land Rover Discovery had reached a point where the cost of the next service exceeded its value, so it had to go.

The pre-loved Range Rover Vogue SE has a 4.4L turbo diesel engine and has been a joy to drive but it has been less joyful paying for it.

The fuel economy struggles to reach 30mpg but isn't a problem as my mileage is fairly low. Road tax at £675 works out at 10p per mile. It would hurt less if I travelled further.

Now there are worrying messages appearing on the dashboard and also from Will at Will's Autos, so what to do?

As I now travel only 500 to 600 miles a month I am considering going electric. But what are the pros and cons?

The pros suggest that a good two or three year old electric car is as cheap as chips. The petrol or diesel versions of such models are much more expensive and it seems you can buy a lot of car at three years old with fewer that 20,000 miles on the clock for £10,000 to £15,000. And it will help save the planet.

Running costs, by charging at home, will be negligible. Road tax will be zero. Insurance may be reduced, but not a lot. What are the cons? Range anxiety probably comes top of the list. A very nice used Mazda claims a range of only 124 miles (and several others up to 200 miles). Most of my journeys are round trips to Tenbury, Bromyard, Leominster or Ludlow with longer trips occasionally to Hereford, Worcester or Shrewsbury. The furthest of these has a round trip of less than 100 miles.


But, I hear you ask, what about travelling in winter with headlights on, windscreen wipers running and the heater on full? Will that reduce the range? I'm sorry, I don't know the answer. Our electrician advises us to install a dedicated external car charging point (cost £1,000) and not to rely on an extension lead plugged into a threepin socket.

I do however have a "get out of jail" card for any longer journey as I can ask my wife nicely if I can use her petrol driven car which goes over 400 miles on one tankful. And there's always a good chance of finding a petrol station if we run low.

If I do make the leap to electric I will let you know – but only if there's a space to fill in the magazine!

## Apple and blackberry crumble

Make this seasonal apple and blackberry crumble for a comforting family pud. Pre-cooking the topping will make it extra-crispy, while also retaining the texture of the fruit. Serves 4

#### Ingredients

#### For the crumble topping

120g plain flour 60g caster sugar 60g unsalted butter at room temperature, cut into pieces

### For the fruit compote

300g Braeburn apple 30g unsalted butter 30g demerara sugar 115g blackberries ¼ tsp ground cinnamon vanilla ice cream, to serve

## Method

Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Tip 120g plain flour and 60g caster sugar into a large bowl.

Add 60g unsalted butter, then rub into the flour using your fingertips to make a light breadcrumb texture. Do not overwork it or the crumble will become heavy.

Sprinkle the mixture evenly over a baking sheet and bake for 15 mins or until lightly





coloured.

Meanwhile, for the compote, peel, core and cut 300g Braeburn apples into 2cm dice.

Put 30g unsalted butter and 30g demerara sugar in a medium saucepan and melt together over a medium heat. Cook for 3 mins until the mixture turns to a light caramel.

Stir in the apples and cook for 3 mins. Add 115g blackberries and  $\frac{1}{4}$  tsp ground cinnamon, and cook for 3 mins more.

Cover, remove from the heat, then leave for 2-3 mins to continue cooking in the warmth of the pan.

To serve, spoon the warm fruit into an ovenproof gratin dish, top with the crumble mix, then reheat in the oven for 5-10 mins. Serve with vanilla ice cream.

## The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams


The Dictionary of Lost Words by Pip Williams is an enchanting book about women and words, love and loss – tender, moving and sometimes heart-breaking.

It tells the story of Esme who, as a child, went every day with her father to the Scriptorium where the editor of the first Oxford English Dictionary, James Murray, worked with his team of lexicographers on words and their definitions. The Scriptorium was a shed in the garden of Murray's house in Oxford. As a child Esme sat under the big table where Murray's assistants worked. One day a slip of paper containing a forgotten word fluttered to

the ground and she picked it up and put it in her pocket – and so her collection of lost words began.

As she grew up Esme collected other words, words which were spoken but never written down because the people who used them couldn't read or write, words which were too crude or offensive for the dictionary.

The story spans the end of the nineteenth and the beginning of the twentieth centuries and bril-



liantly mixes fact with fiction. Esme is briefly involved with the suffragette movement and lives through the First World War. All the time she is learning and noting down the words which poor and uneducated people, especially women, used to describe their experiences of life.

The book is full of finely drawn characters: Lizzie, a servant at the Murrays' house who looks after the motherless Esme and guides her through her growing up, Esme's father and her aunt Ditte, James Murray, his wife and daughters and the men in his team, the people Esme meets in the markets and

pubs of Oxford and the injured soldiers coming back from the war – all leap from the page and help to weave a fascinating story about the making of the dictionary and the words that were left behind.

If you love words you'll love this book, a love letter to words and language.

# **Teme Valley Wildlife**

2024 has been a difficult year for gardeners and farmers alike. Persistent rain, cool night temperatures and low light levels have made growing plants a challenge.

Many gardeners noticed a springtime surge in slug and snail populations and most found them well-nigh impossible to com-bat. After early losses, I tested a strategy new

to me, a low barrier of copper mesh fixed around my emerging vegetable seedlings. It is one I can recommend. For my clematis, whose buds were being eaten as soon as they formed, I made a doit-yourself barrier from old plastic nets in which daffodil bulbs had been sold. Tied around the base of the stems where the buds were forming, these were unsightly but effective. Although the growth of my vegetables and some flowers slowed down early on, it caught up as the year progressed and the plants were eventually productive.

I think this shows an important lesson about nature. There is an inherent adaptability in biological systems which preserves life. A concept once dubbed "the selfish gene" tried to explain how natural variation and evolution act to protect living organisms.

There is always an ecological balance in operation which prioritises survival. I was impressed, after fuming at the work of slugs in my garden, that I then began to feel empty snail shells crunch under my wellingtons. My garden thrushes were having a field day with my snails. It is worth remembering that any population which suddenly rises benefits that of its predators. Their numbers increase

too. Next year, the increased predators lower the population on which they prey back down to an average level.

Something similar happened to butterfly numbers this year. Butterflies were more abundant last year than any year I can remember. This year's crash in numbers, although undoubtedly aided by the wet weather, was in part a natural phenomenon where population numbers rise and fall from year to year. I certainly won't be predicting no butterflies in 2025, I have every confidence that they will bounce back. It must be so, because life hasn't survived on this planet for untold millennia without a few bumps along the way.

An unexpected benefit of so much wet weather has been the abundant growth of brambles – not at first sight a good thing. But what a fantastic crop of blackberries there has been this year! And next year there will be more nectar to



boost the butterflies, not to mention more berries for us to make into pies.

Another welcome appearance in 2024 was that of the ghost orchid. This diminutive plant was first spotted not far away in Herefordshire in 1854. It has been recorded sporadically over the years and was then deemed extinct – until one flowered fifteen years ago. It has flowered once again in 2024, probably in the Welsh Marches (but I can't know for sure, it's a secret).

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group is at 7:30pm on Thursday 10th October at Stoke Bliss and Kyre village hall. It is always a pleasure to welcome Rosemary Winnall, whose talk is called "In search of ancient trackways". Everyone is most welcome and it is just £3 on the door.
