

Dear Readers

Whilst preparing to write this, I thought I would take a look at a few back issues of TemeTalk. Flicking through various copies looking for inspiration, I came to the August 2019 issue and the photo of Sue Softly and me taken at our Confirmation service in Upton on Severn on 23rd June. That day was a turning point for me and in some ways, as the memory of it fills my mind, it feels like only a few months ago. The reality is that it was four years ago.

Little did any of us know what was to follow. In the spring of 2020 we found all our lives disrupted, we were locked out of our churches due to the Covid pandemic and 'church' went online! The world as we knew it was changed as people began working from home, teaching our children at home and limiting the times we could spend together with those we love.

For me, from the moment I knelt before the bishop at Confirmation and surrendered to Christ, I knew my world had changed. It became a time of discernment and waiting as I began a journey of two years of Licensed Lay Ministry/Reader (LLM) training at Queens Theological college followed by interviews, more discernment, waiting and additional training. I began the Worcester Diocesan Auxiliary Pathway to Ordination in September 2022 alongside my continuing LLM training. Fast forward to 2023 and here I am, still soaking up the news that I am to be ordained at Worcester Cathedral on Sunday 24th September at 6.30pm.

I am really looking forward to being a curate here in Teme Valley South where I will continue my training with and be mentored by Rev'd Julia.

Some people have said they hope that this doesn't change me. I think those of you who know me well have seen a change; but I'm still me. Change isn't something to fear, it has been life changing for me, and I am truly blessed to be walking the path that God has revealed. Cellulitis can kill

When Liz Cattani noticed a rash on her arm and started to feel hot and shivery, she went to A&E and found herself in a hospital bed and on a drip for three days. She had cellulitis, a common bacterial skin infection that causes redness, swelling, and pain. If it spreads it can cause serious health problems.

Liz had been hedge cutting and picking up the clippings without wearing thick gloves. It's likely that a sharp twig had pierced her thumb allowing bacteria to enter her blood stream. She had surgery on her thumb to remove the poison and three different types of antibiotics to prevent the infection spreading.

Cellulitis is scary and can kill if left untreated, so take care when gardening – remember, prevention is better than cure.



Aubergine moussaka rolls

Moussaka is a labour of love which is totally worth it when you have the time. But when you don't, these rolls are the answer. Transforming the big layered oven-baked dish into a slightly lighter snackable affair, this recipe is great for bringing to a friend's house as it just needs a quick blast under the grill before serving. *Serves 4-6*





Ingredients

Olive oil for brushing and frying 1 red onion, finely chopped 250g lamb mince 1 garlic clove, crushed 1 tbsp tomato purée 100ml red wine 227g tin chopped tomatoes Pinch ground cinnamon 2 large aubergines 30g unsalted butter 2 tbsp plain flour 350ml whole milk 1 medium egg yolk, lightly beaten Freshly grated nutmeg to serve 15g parmesan or other hard cheese, finely grated



Method

Heat a large pan over a medium-high heat and add a little oil. Add the onion with a pinch of salt and fry until softened and light golden. Stir in the mince, breaking it up with a wooden spoon. After a few minutes, once it's started to brown, add the garlic and tomato purée and cook for another minute or so.

Pour in the wine and bubble for a few minutes until reduced to almost nothing, then add the chopped tomatoes and cinnamon. Bring to a simmer and bubble for at least 30 minutes, stirring regularly, until the sauce has reduced so it just coats the meat.

Meanwhile, cut the aubergines lengthways into 5mm thick slices. Heat a griddle pan over a high heat, brush the slices with a little oil and cook for a few minutes on each side, until lightly charred. You'll need to do this in batches. Lay the slices on a tray or board.

For the bechamel, heat the butter in a medium pan. Once melted, stir in the flour and cook for a few minutes. Gradually add the milk, stirring constantly to make a creamy sauce. Once it's all combined, gently cook for 5 minutes over a medium heat to thicken. Remove from the heat, stir in the egg yolk, grate over some nutmeg and season.

Heat the grill to high. Pour the bechamel into a baking dish. Add a spoonful of the meat filling near the bottom end of an aubergine slice, then wrap the aubergine around it to create a little stuffed roll. Nestle the roll in the bechamel sauce seam-side down. Repeat until all the meat and aubergine is used up. Sprinkle over the parmesan and pop under a hot grill for a few minutes until everything is golden and bubbling.

The arrival of Jefferson's daughter Jessica, played by the engaging Lucy Smith with another

convincing American accent, had a profound effect on her estranged father. Lauren Bell, breezy PR guru, physiotherapist and wife of the group's sponsor, who also had a profound effect not only on Jefferson but on the whole plot, was

played with great verve by Rachel Packard.

And finally Jeremy Boaz, Colin Love, Gavin McEwan, Alison Pelling, Just Raymond and John Sly added atmosphere to the performance as a gaggle of journalists hot on Jefferson's trail.

Peter Hayter was ably assisted by producer Cathy Warburton and by the excellent set design, sound and lighting. The programme warned of "occasional loud bangs" - it wasn't wrong!

Everything turned out all right in the end, as it usually does! The Stratford Players finally produced an accomplished performance of King Lear, Jefferson found his true vocation - and his true love - and was reunited with Jessica, and the Stratford Players were invited to the real Stratford to perform King Lear.







Teme Valley Wildlife

Have you been suffering from hay fever lately? If so, you are not alone because nearly half of the population succumbs to itchy, watery eyes and noses at some time or another. This year's high pollen counts have made it more common than ever. Pollen from trees, grasses and weeds trigger the symptoms. All the main culprits pro-



duce masses of tiny grains which are carried on the wind and thus have the potential to be breathed in and cause a reaction. Wind-pollinated plants produce very light grains that can travel many miles, so you don't even need to be close by to suffer their effects.

What are pollen grains and what are they for? They are tiny structures by which male DNA is conveyed to female DNA within plants. They range in size from 15 to 100 microns and are usually round or oval. Their surfaces can be smooth, grooved, granular or spined, and these characteristics help to identify which species they belong to. The study of pollen is called palynology and experts at Worcester University compile national pollen counts and, in conjunction with the Met Of-



fice, daily pollen forecasts between mid-March and early October. The first allergenic pollen of the year is tree pollen, followed by grass and nettles. 95% of hay fever sufferers are affected by grass pollen, 20% by tree pollen. Of the latter birch and plane trees cause the most trouble. Birch produces a bumper crop of pollen one year,

then a lesser one the next.

Pollen grains possess a tough outer coating made from a substance called sporocellulin. This can survive for centuries, particularly in water, peat or lake sediments. This quality has made them important to archaeologists who look for them in pottery, tools and fabrics found at archaeological sites. Pollen dating, in which particular groupings of pollen types known from specific eras are compared with a test sample, can be used to date artefacts in times much earlier than those amenable to radiocarbon dating. Archaeologists also use such information to judge changes in climate, land use and forestation. The presence of pollen from cornfield weeds has been employed

to track the spread of agriculture during the Neolithic period.

As wildlife enthusiasts, we are frequently encouraged to plant flowers to attract pollinators. These are the insects (and occasionally other creatures) who transport pollen for flowering plants. It is amazing that flowering plants only produce




attractive flowers in order to entice insects to do a better pollinating job than the wind. Pollen from one flower, if transferred to the female organs of a different flower of the same species, ensures health and vigour within a plant population. Flowering plants also came up with the idea of providing nectar to reward their helpers. Without them there would be no honeybees. Unlike the pollen produced by wind-pollinated plants, flowering plant pollen is sticky and clump-forming to help it adhere to insects. Some flowers, notably orchids, have special sacs of pollen called pollinia which the plants ensure go through elaborate manoeuvres in order to facilitate exact transfer from one plant to the next. Clever plants.


