### Dear Readers

I am so glad that it is my turn to greet you from the Teme Valley South Ministry Team. It has been a great joy to remain part of the parish since I made the move to Tenbury where I join a long line of TVS expats. Our very real links with the town were brought home to me with the realisation that the Tenbury Food Bank has been serving the parish well this past year and we have been able to reciprocate by making donations. The wonderful Christmas Tree Festival at Stanford gave almost £1,000. Of course the need for contributions continues and we will go on doing our best.

The year has turned. The days are lengthening. The weather is unpredictable and times are difficult. And yet, and yet ... there are signs of change in the air. Serious issues are being brought out into the open, genuine and earnest efforts to articulate priorities, it seems to me. In community life there is a renewed desire to serve, to care for our neighbours, to protect the vulnerable, to cherish the land, to find peace. In public discourse these priorities are also coming to the fore. We can only pray that they take root and are manifested in planning for the future – a future which sets the planet on a course to sustainability, where the focus is on working hard to provide for all from finite resources. This may mean living more simply, that others may simply live.

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#### Environment corner - what happens to your recyclable waste?

Have you ever wondered what happens to the contents of your green wheelie bin after it is collected? Perhaps you have heard rumours that it isn't really recycled at all, but goes into landfill, is incinerated or is shipped off to a developing cated – you can find details on the Severn Waste website at www.severnwaste.com/envirosort/what-can-i-recycle/. In brief, allowable items are food tins, drinks cans and aerosols, glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles, tubs, pots

country and ends up in the ocean. Happily this isn't true, at least in Worcestershire and Herefordshire. All household recyclable waste for the two counties (70,000 tonnes per year) is taken to the Envirosort facility outside Worcester where it is pro-

cessed. I saw the process first hand during a recent visit to Envirosort, and my aim here is to give you an idea of how it all works. This helps to make sense of the recycling rules.

The refuse lorries tip their loads of mingled recyclable waste at the entrance to the facility and it then passes through a series of sorting stages. An initial hand sort removes obviously unsuitable items and the stream then passes onto a glass breaker where glass items are crushed so that the fragments fall through. The next phase is an inclined ramp called a ballistic separator – light flat items (paper and card) are shuffled up the ramp, whilst three-dimensional objects, such as bottles and cans, roll downwards. Metal objects are then removed magnetically, leaving plastic items which are sorted into different categories using optical beams. Finally, the different materials are baled up separately and sent off for recycling.

The rules for what can and cannot be included in your recycling are quite compli-



and trays, drinks cartons, paper and card. It is important that all items are reasonably clean, and there are a few additional subtleties: and card paper items are best if flat (squash boxes and cartons) so that they climb upwards on the ballistic sorter.

whilst plastic items and aluminium cans should not be squashed too much, so they travel down. Black plastic does not reflect the optical sorting beams and so passes straight through to be discarded, so it should not be placed in your recycling bin.

Most people find that the recycling bin fills up more quickly than the black bin, so recycling all this material really is worthwhile.

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

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# Off the beaten track

This lovely article about our area was written by Ian Marchant, who signed the Eastham visitors' book with his wife Hilary on 12th November 2022. You never quite know who is passing through!

Most people who live in Presteigne will, at one time or another, take the road from the Salway

Arms on the A49 south of Ludlow, through Tenbury Wells and up to the M5 a little past Droitwich. It's the quickest way to Birmingham and to the M40 for London and the M42 for all points north east. For 10 years I worked at Birmingham City University, and

this road (formed by the A456 and A443, for road nerds) was a regular commute, so I drove it two or three times a week in all seasons.

Now my wife and I take it once a fortnight to visit our 18-month-old grandson (and to some extent, his parents) in Coventry. It's a corking road, it really is, through hopyards, along the left bank of the River Teme; but we are always passing through. A few weeks ago, we thought to cross the River Teme at Eastham

and take some time to explore the unfamiliar right-hand side of the valley.

I remembered meeting a fellow Tolkien nut at an event in Tenbury who assured me that the Teme Valley was the original model for the Shire. Stand-

ing outside St Mary's, it was easy to believe.

We finished our detour at St Andrew's, an estate church packed with features designed to delight the church-crawler's heart, and which is right by the famous Shelsley Walsh Hill climb course.

God's kingdom is here, it seems to me, and sometimes all we have to do to notice is to take an unfamiliar turn.

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# A day of surprises

So on New Year's Eve we set off to visit the Boss's mother and father, who are buried in the lovely little churchyard at St Padarn's church, just over the Welsh border at Crossgates. My first surprise was that this small Victorian church has a Norman sculptured tympanum over the south doorway, probably carved by the Herefordshire school of sculpture in about 1140 (see below).



Having admired the tympanum we decided to look for lunch in Llandrindod Wells, just up the road. The Boss said he didn't hold out much hope, so imagine our surprise when, driving through the deserted and drizzly streets, we came upon the Metropole Hotel, right in the middle of town. I was surprised because I hadn't expected to find such



an imposing building which looked as though it belonged on the promenade at a seaside resort. The Boss was surprised because he'd been here before, and remembered the hotel being run down and dilapidated, but now it was fresh and clean and welcoming, flags flying, lights blazing.

(The hotel was opened as Coleman's Hotel in 1872 as the town grew up around the mineral rich spring waters and the railway which arrived in the nineteenth century, and later it became The Bridge Hotel. Apparently the name was changed in 1911 when the owner, Mrs Miles, bought a large quantity of linen, cutlery and crockery from the Metropole Hotel in Cromer, Norfolk, all bearing the monogram 'M'.)

At the front of the hotel overlooking the quiet main street we found Spencer's Brasserie. Outside it was dark and wet but the room was bright and cheerful with a pleasant hum of conversation.



We had a delicious lunch and then the Boss said we should walk around the lake, so we drove back through the almost deserted town and found another surprise. Here was a beautiful lake and it seemed that everyone in the town who wasn't enjoying lunch at the Metropole Hotel was here. There was a bustling café and gift shop and a weak sun appeared as we joined the many people – couples, families and dog walkers – strolling around the lake with its magnificent dragon statue in the middle and swans and ducks floating serenely around the edges.

In its heyday Llandrindod Wells was a lively resort town where Victorians queued to take the waters, entertained by bands and orchestras. It's quieter now, but still full of surprises! SG

# **Teme Valley Wildlife**

One of the joys of February is the sight of a great expanse of crocuses in bloom; it serves to

banish winter. I enjoy growing the bulbs in my garden and although I am a long way from achieving a carpet of colour, I like to experiment with different varieties in pots before setting them into the ground. The best displays that I know of in the area are at the entrance to The Elms Hotel at Abber-

ley and in the churchyard of St George's church in Kidderminster. Both are easily visible from the road. A display only accessible on foot, but a lot further away, is the churchyard of St Chad's church in Shrewsbury. This is absolutely crammed with a single species called *crocus tommasinianus* and is an utterly amazing sight.

I first came across this particular species some years ago, whilst on a walk in the Welsh marches. The path traversed the border town of Knighton. Along the edge of a park, masses



of lovely pale violet crocuses spilled out from neighbouring gardens. I instantly fell in love

with them. Determined to try and grow them in my own garden, I found out what they were and then sent off to the bulb suppliers for some bulbs. Only later did I discover that rabbits like them even more than I do.

The nineteenth-century Italian botanist Muzio Guiseppe Spirito de'

Tommasini is remembered in their name which, despite being so tongue-twisting, has also been given to a variety of campanula. What I like about them is the silvery outside colour of the petals and the light violet interior. The flowers only open when the sun shines, to reveal zingy, bright orange stamens that are irresistible to bees. The species naturalises with ease, although some varieties sold under the same name are actually newer commercial

forms which are not quite as good at spreading.

Another crocus keen to nip out of gardens is purple *crocus vernus*, or spring crocus. This has been grown in British gardens since at least the start of the seventeenth century and has in some places established itself in the wild.

Crocuses are native to Europe and the Middle East, but most garden types are crosses between different species. How they first came to Britain is open for discussion. Some people think they were brought back by returning Crusaders. This is especially said of the saffron crocus, an autumn-flowering variety with culinary uses. It was once grown in the vicinity of Saffron Waldon, giving its name to the town. Whilst talking about early spring flowers it is worth mentioning a couple of other garden flowers that are good for feeding bees. Both snowdrop and hellebore attract bees when the weather is warm enough for them to be on the wing. Snowdrops like dry shade and hellebores are tough customers who seem to thrive anywhere. It is worth considering if you can squeeze these plants into a small space in your garden because insects struggle to find food in the early spring and any help we gardeners can give will be rewarded.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will take place at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall on Thursday 9th February 9th at 7.30pm. We welcome Jonty Pearce whose talk is entitled "Sailing around St Kilda". Everyone is most welcome and it is just £2 on the door.

### **David Clifford Arthur Powell**

We sadly said farewell to David Powell on 2nd December when several hundred people gathered at Rochford Church to pay their respects and celebrate a good, full, and honest life in Rochford, where farming and the countryside dominated everything that David achieved.

David was born on 25th July 1936 at Bank Farm Rochford, where he lived and worked all his life. He really did not want to be anywhere else. He walked to Rochford school (now the village hall) joining the other 20 or so pupils, although he did not like school and ran away more than once.

Rochford School closed in 1947 so he went on to Tenbury School and later to Fishmore Hall in

Ludlow. Whilst he was at school, he began his own little farming enterprise. He acquired 20 ewes, keeping them with Mr Fletcher from Bliss Gate, Rock, and would cycle

up to Bliss Gate to check them. In return he would have all the wool and half the lambs. This was called "sheep at halves".

In 1952 he finished school and joined the 16 men who worked at Bank Farm. Agricultural classes at Ludlow College and a first class diploma of agriculture from the Shropshire Farm Institute (Walford College) laid the foundations for a successful life with agriculture at its heart.

He started pig farming in those early days with 20 sows he kept at Brook Farm, Kyrewood but it was the dairy and hops at Bank Farm that really interested him.

He joined Tenbury Young Farmers and remained actively involved all his life, advising and providing a venue for the annual rally and other YFC events. He became Tenbury's president and vice-president of the Worcestershire Federation.

Tenbury Agricultural Society also became a lifelong commitment for him. In 1991 he was presented with the TAS gold medal, recognising his hard work and commitment to the society.

David met Pam at a dance at Kingsland Coronation Hall and their courtship flourished and survived, even when Pam was at teacher training college in Doncaster. They were married at Hamnish Church on 14th April 1962. They were excited to celebrate their diamond wedding anniversary last year.

There are many memories of David including that unmistakable laugh – whatever the occasion you knew when he had entered the building! He enjoyed music and loved to sing. He had a very good singing voice. He was very practical and loved problem solving – he was very happy to have a go at any job. He had a thirst for knowledge and was always interested in other people. He kept endless scrap books, all in chronological order, of photos and newspaper cuttings.

He enjoyed putting together his museums, one in the old cow house at Bank Farm full of farm tools and implements and one at Beechcroft containing a myriad of household items from

> days gone by, all labelled and in order. He created an allotment at the back of the old school next to Beechcroft and spent many a happy hour there. Walking was a great pas-

sion and he loved nothing better than being with his dog out in the beautiful Teme valley. He was never without a dog.

Dave was well travelled and enjoyed trips to Australia, New Zealand and Canada.

He was proud of his children, Caroline and Martin, and of his two grandchildren, Oliver and Dominic. Despite the best efforts of his grandchildren, he never quite got his head around the internet, emails and bluetooth!

David will be missed in Rochford. He supported and took part in village activities and was always happy to lend a hand with the village hall and the church. Most recently he enjoyed providing a taxi service with his pickup for people coming to the lambing service in the village.

Dave's motto was "Whatever you do, you must put your heart and soul into it and with the help of God, you will be rewarded".
