





D-Day – 6th June 1944

6th June 2024 is the 80th anniversary of D-Day – but why is D-Day important?

On 6th June 1944, Allied forces launched a combined naval, air and land assault on Nazi-occupied France, the start of operation Overlord.

Just after midnight on

6th June, Allied airborne troops began dropping behind enemy lines. Their job was to blow up bridges, sabotage railway lines, and take other measures to prevent the enemy from rushing reinforcements to the invasion beaches. Hours later, the largest amphibious landing force ever assembled began moving through the stormtossed waters toward the beaches.

By nightfall about 160,000 Allied troops were ashore with nearly a million more men on the way that summer.

The invasion, if successful, would drain German resources and block access to key military sites. Securing a bridgehead in Normandy would allow the Allies to establish a viable presence in northern Europe for the first time since the Allied evacuation from Dunkirk in 1940.

A command team led by American General Dwight D Eisenhower was formed in December



1943 to plan the naval, air and land operations. Deception campaigns were developed to draw German attention – and strength – away from Normandy.

By 1944, over 2 million troops from over 12 countries were in Britain in preparation for the inva-

sion. On D-Day, Allied forces consisted primarily of American, British and Canadian troops but also included Australian, Belgian, Czech, Dutch, French, Greek, New Zealand, Norwegian, Rhodesian and Polish naval, air or ground support.

Overlord did not bring an end to the war in Europe, but it did begin the process through which victory was eventually achieved. By the end of August 1944, the German Army was in full retreat from France, but by September Allied momentum had slowed. The Germans regrouped and launched a failed but determined counter-offensive in the Ardennes in December 1944. This defeat sapped German manpower and resources and allowed the Allies to resume their advance towards Germany.

Incidentally, the term D-Day is used by the Armed Forces to refer to the beginning of an operation. The 'D' simply stands for 'day'.

Eton mess roulade



A vanilla roulade filled with strawberries, cream and meringues, this Eton mess roulade is the perfect summer pud to share with friends.

Serves 6-8

Ingredients

4 large free-range eggs, separated 75g golden caster sugar, plus extra to dust 75g self-raising flour 75g whole blanched almonds or unsalted pistachios, toasted in a hot dry pan and whizzed in a small food processor – or use pre-ground nuts 1 tsp vanilla extract

For the Eton mess filling 400g ripe strawberries, half chopped 1-2 tbsp icing sugar (optional) 300ml double cream 4 meringue nests, crumbled

Method

Heat the oven to 200°C fan/gas 7. Using an electric mixer, whisk the egg yolks and caster sugar in a bowl for 5-6 minutes until thick and creamy and the beaters leave a ribbon pattern on the surface of the mixture when lifted. Gently fold in the flour, toasted nuts and vanilla.

In a separate bowl, whisk the egg whites to soft peaks (the peaks should flop over when you lift out the beaters). Add a spoonful of the whites to the cake batter and fold in briskly using a large spoon to loosen the mixture; fold in the rest in gentle figure-of-eight movements – you don't want to overmix and knock all the air out. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin, level the top, then bake for 12-15 minutes until the sponge is risen, golden and springy to the touch.

Dust the sheet of baking paper with caster sugar. When the sponge is baked, use oven gloves to turn it out onto the paper. Roll up the sponge from the short end like a swiss roll while still warm, rolling the paper too so it stays between the sponge layers, then leave to cool.

For the filling, whizz the chopped strawberries (with the icing sugar if they're a bit sharp) until smooth. Whip the cream to soft peaks in a bowl using a balloon whisk or electric mixer – be careful not to over-whip as it will thicken when you fold in the strawberries/sauce/meringue. Slice most of the remaining strawberries, keeping a few halves to garnish, then gently swirl the slices into the cream with the strawberry sauce and most of the crumbled meringue.

Carefully unroll the cooled sponge, then spread with the Eton mess mixture and roll up like a swiss roll again. Top with extra meringue pieces, then serve on a platter with the reserved strawberries and any leftover Eton mess on the side.

Learning to drive in 1966 (and 2024)

Our 16-year-old American grandson Henry is learning to drive in his dad's automatic Volvo in New Jersey. It made me think about my driving test in Stourbridge in August 1966.

When I learnt to drive, lessons cost £1, or 17/6d (87¹2p) if you had your own car. I used my mother's Triumph Herald convertible.

I had far more lessons than I needed so my driving instructor and I used to pootle around the town, doing the odd three-point-turn or emergency stop. His biggest worry was my difficulty with left and right, which caused me to

go the wrong way up a one-way street on the way to my driving test – not a good start.

All my friends were learning to drive as well and those who had taken their tests warned us about the examiner in the loud check sports jacket. I arrived at the test centre in a state of high anxiety – I was wearing trousers because my instructor thought my skirts were too short; he'd also moved the rear view mirror so I had to duck my head to look in it which he said would prove to the examiner that I was using it, but I thought just looked as though I hadn't adjusted it correctly.

And there he was, Mr Loud Check Sports Jacket himself, waiting for me. We set off and all seemed to be going well. I was expecting him to

tell me to stop using hand signals, but after a while he told me to stop using the indicators and just use hand signals for the rest of the test.

I should explain that we all had to learn to use hand signals, which meant opening the window and sticking your arm straight out to turn right, or making a big anticlockwise circle to turn left. Usually you just had to prove that you could do them. My friend Margaret didn't have to do them at all in her test because her examiner had a bad cold and wanted to keep the windows shut.

So having to use hand sig-

nals for the whole test seemed like very bad news, especially as the last manoeuvre before arriving back at the test centre was a hill start and a right turn onto a busy main road. I definitely didn't have enough hands for that one!

But despite my misgivings and despite Mr Loud Check Sports Jacket growling at me when I got one of the Highway Code questions wrong, I passed!

So that's a lot of things Henry will never have to worry about – clutch control, changing gear, reversing without a camera, finding his way without a satnav – not to mention those pesky hand signals.

A recent letter to The Times from an eminent cathedral organist provoked considerable comment. The basic point of his letter was that he dis-

liked the hymn All things bright and beautiful as the words were too sentimental and the tune was worse. He thought it had become popular at recent weddings and funerals because so few people attended church regularly and this was a hymn many remem-

bered from junior school. Other hymns were not available.

Letters followed, largely agreeing with the sentiments, but one in particular caught my eye.

The writer referred to the "bicycle hymn", which had caused family mirth over the years:

"And can it be that I should gain ..." and in the third verse...

"My chains fell off, my heart was free I rose, went forth, and followed Thee."

Chains falling off would slow down any cyclist.

My favourite hymn is *Cwm Rhondda – Guide me O thou great Redeemer*, especially performed by a male voice choir.

At my own wedding my family of regular Methodist chapel-goers who were enthusiastic

(and loud) singers all turned up to sing. But my bride had overruled me in our choice of hymns. Later on in the ceremony the vicar, unprompted,

> said that he thought we should have chosen *Guide me O thou great Redeemer* as the singing was so good. Hindsight is marvellous!

> More recently we attended the funeral of a very dear friend in Merthyr Tydfil where I ex-

pected an outpouring of traditional Welsh song. To my surprise hardly anyone sang although my favourite hymn was chosen. I discovered that the family followed soccer and Cardiff City in particular – maybe if they had been rugby fans it would have been different.

Another of my favourite hymns is "Who would true valour see, let him come hither" with a later line "Hobgoblin nor foul fiend can daunt his spirit".

This hymn, generally known as *To be a pilgrim*, was written by John Bunyan and appeared in *The Pilgrim's Progress* in 1684, at a time when the Puritans disapproved of music in church. Today it's sung as a hymn the world over. We sang it possibly once a week in school assembly, as did my son 30 years later.

Teme Valley Wildlife

Stoke Bliss and Kyre village hall was filled to the brim back in January, making a great start to Teme Valley Wildlife Group's 2024 programme. Our first speaker was ornithologist Mike Metcalf who had come to tell us about Worcestershire's ravens. He has been surveying them for some years now, and investigates the size of the county's population by recording bird numbers and nest sites. He knew from our website that ravens were regularly being seen in the Teme valley and hoped to enlist our help in finding them. He had compared the

number of monthly sightings in the TVWG's Common Bird Survey with national data from the British Trust for Ornithology and found them to tally exactly.

I, for one, am fascinated by these splendid birds and love to hear their swishing wingbeats if they fly over me as I'm buried in the garden border pulling up weeds. They also sail along to see what's going on when I feed my sheep on winter



mornings. I always wave and call out "Hello ravens!" and am sometimes rewarded by a change of flight path as they come in closer to see who this silly person is. If I'm very, very lucky, there will be a dipped wing or a demonstration of fancy flying to show off "Red Arrow" style aerobatic skills.

At the end of Mike's talk, a queue of fellow raven-spotters formed, keen to tell him about their local birds. So it was that, come April, I had the pleasure of accompanying him down to a wood where I had a strong suspicion that those near me had

built a nest. Mike's hearing was sharply attuned to bird sounds and as the wood came into view he heard their first calls. They were quiet at this point and as I had heard nothing at all I quickly stopped prattling to allow him to judge their location. Then, as we neared the edge of the wood, two ravens took to the air and began a range of different calls. Mike interpreted them for me. Some

were alarm calls, some were warnings, some told other birds to keep away and some were calls between a nesting pair. To us, there was an obvious "clear off" call.

Once between the trees we started to look up, craning our necks to see into the tallest branches. Ravens prefer to nest in conifer trees and select a

high location which they commonly use again. We soon spotted a twiggy nest with an alert raven standing guard above it. There was no evidence of any young birds, but the presence of two parents and a nest beneath which plant leaves were splotched with bright white guano was evidence enough that the nest was in use. Mike was pleased to record a site previously unknown to him, making it the 36th nest in the county.

If you happen to know of a nest, or a possible location for one, and could take that number higher, please contact Mike at mikebirder@hotmail.com. I'm sure he would be delighted to hear from you.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at 7.30pm on Thursday 13th June at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall. We welcome Dominique Cragg whose talk is intriguingly entitled "Worcestershire's Rainforests". Members and friends are all welcome, it is just £3 on the door.
