

Dear Readers

As we approach the coronation of King Charles III it is worth reflecting on the significance of this event in terms of both the monarchy and our faith today.

The coronation is a solemn ceremony that dates back over a thousand years and it has been an important part of our British history and culture. It is a time when the monarch is officially crowned and anointed with holy oil – a powerful symbol of the monarch's authority and duty to serve the people of the realm.

But the coronation is not just a secular ceremony – it is also a deeply religious one. The anointing of the monarch with holy oil is a reminder of the monarch's role as head of the church and a representative of God on earth. Taking the oath to uphold the laws of God is a powerful statement of the monarch's commitment to justice and righteousness.

As Christians we believe that God has a plan and purpose for our lives, and that He has established rulers and authorities to govern over us. We are called to pray for our leaders and to submit to their authority, recognising that ultimately all authority comes from God Himself.

In the context of the coronation, this means that we are called to pray for King Charles III and to support him in his role as monarch. We are called to honour his authority and to recognise that he has been called by God to serve as our king. But the coronation also reminds us of our own role as Christians in the world. We are called to be salt and light in our communities, to stand up for justice and righteousness, and to serve others with love and compassion.

As we witness the coronation of King Charles III, we should be inspired to live out these values in our own lives. We should be motivated to pray for our leaders and to work for the good of our communities, recognising that ultimately we are called to serve God in all that we do. Angel Gardens has been trading for five years and although it hasn't always been plain sailing, they have managed to move forward thanks to the loyalty of so many of their customers.



Coronation quiche

Seventy years after coronation chicken was created to celebrate the Queen's ascension, coronation quiche will honour her heir.

From "poulet reine Elizabeth" in 1953 to the lemon and amaretti "platinum pudding" last year, royal occasions have always demanded a signature dish. King Charles and Queen Camilla have continued this tradition, sharing a "personally chosen" recipe for the popular oven-baked savoury tart.

Ingredients

For the pastry:

125g plain flour Pinch of salt 25g cold butter, diced 25g lard 2 tbsp milk (Or 1 x 250g block of ready-made shortcrust pastry)

For the filling:

125ml milk
175ml double cream
2 medium eggs
1 tbsp chopped fresh tarragon
Salt and pepper
100g grated cheddar
180g cooked spinach, lightly chopped
60g cooked broad beans or soya beans

TCS

Method

To make the pastry, sieve the flour and salt into a bowl. Add the fats and rub the mixture together using your fingertips until you get a sandy texture.

Add the milk a little at a time and bring the in-

gredients together into a dough. Cover and allow to rest in the fridge for 30-45 minutes.

Lightly flour the work surface and roll out the pastry to a circle approximately 5mm thick and a little larger than the top of the 20cm flan tin.

Line the tin with the pastry. Cover and rest for 30 minutes in the fridge.

Preheat the oven to 190°C.

Line the pastry case with greaseproof paper, add baking beans and bake blind for 15 minutes. Remove the greaseproof paper and baking beans and reduce the oven temperature to 160°C.

Beat together the milk, cream, eggs, herbs and seasoning.

Scatter ½ of the grated cheese in the blindbaked base, top with the chopped spinach and beans and herbs, then pour over the liquid mixture. If required gently give the mixture a delicate stir to ensure the filling is evenly dispersed but be careful not to damage the pastry case.

Sprinkle over the remaining cheese. Bake for 20-25 minutes until set and lightly golden.

You forget the corkscrew. Just as the first drops of rain begin to fall, someone asks for the mustard.

But well planned picnics can be fun. Think of Twickenham, Henley, Glyndebourne. Sumptuous hampers in the boots of Range Rovers, the popping of champagne corks, a warming mug of soup. For a special picnic take special food, but remember to make sure that it travels well and is easy to eat. Cold chicken pie, rice salad, lots of crunchy things like celery, spring onions, fresh lettuce, a tortilla cut into thick wedges, crusty French bread, cheese, fruit and cake. There are lots of alternatives to soggy sandwiches, sausage rolls and hard boiled eggs!

And everything will taste much nicer and be easier to eat if you take china plates and real cutlery. There's nothing worse than trying to cut a tomato with a plastic knife on a paper plate!

Wine is essential for a romantic summer picnic. Take white wine or champagne in a coolbag to keep it nicely chilled. Cans of beer keep well in a cool box half filled with ice. And it all tastes much better if you drink it from real glasses – get some cheap ones if you don't want to risk your Waterford crystal!

There's an art to organising a good picnic. Make this the summer you finally get it right and you'll have a wonderful time. Whether cheering on your horse, listening to beautiful music or floating high above the clouds in a hot air balloon, there's something very special about eating out of doors. Just remember to take your umbrella – and the corkscrew!

How to boost your retirement pension


Under the new state pension system introduced in April 2016, you generally need a 35-year NI contribution record to qualify for the full state pension amount

Deductions are made from the full pension for any missing years, say for example you have gaps in your record, perhaps because you have worked abroad, had times when you were not working or just had a low income.

Many people don't know that they can pay late voluntary national insurance (NI) contributions to fill gaps in their NI record and boost their state pension entitlement. Under normal rules it is only normally possible to plug gaps in your NI record up to six years after the year in question.

However, for a limited period, people are able to go much further back and fill gaps for any year from 2006-07 onwards and the deadline for doing this has been extended to the end of July 2023. This only applies to those who come under the new state pension system: those who reach state pension age after 5th April 2016.


You usually need to pay voluntary class 3 NI contributions to top up your state pension. The current cost of doing this is £15.85 a week, or £824.20 a year. However this one-off payment can add up to 1/35th of the full rate to your eventual



state pension. As the full new state pension is currently in the 2022-23 tax year £185.15 a week, this boost is worth £5.29 a week, or £275 a year.

If you haven't yet reached state pension age, find out more about your situation by checking your state pension forecast online at gov.uk/check-state-pension. This will help you to identify if you have any gaps and what you can do about them. There are some situations where paying historic contributions would not boost your state pension.

Teme Valley Wildlife

My cousin gave me an excellent new book about trees for Christmas. It isn't a field guide or a celebration of veteran specimens but selects trees from across the world and explains the significance they play in our everyday lives. It is full of fascinating information, much of which I haven't come across before. I



must confess to being poor at identifying trees. I can cope with wildflowers but often get stumped by bigger plants. So many non-native trees grow in our landscape and there are so many hybrids and cultivated varieties that I soon find myself in a muddle. Field guides carefully describe the appearance of buds, leaves, flowers and fruits, but as they are never all on the tree at the same time I forget to go back and look at them in subsequent seasons. So I often fail to identify a tree I'm interested in.

Even the English oak ties me in knots. There are two common oaks growing in Britain, Quercus robur and Quercus petraea. The former is known as English oak, common oak, European oak or pedunculate oak. The latter goes by the names of ses-



sile and durmast oak. Quercus robur has stalked acorns and unstalked leaves, petraea has stalked leaves and unstalked acorns. Confused? You will be, because the two types hybridise. English oak is the nation's quintessential tree. Its short trunk, tall, broad crown and spreading outline make it familiar to us

all. It was used to build Henry VIII's warship, the Mary Rose, and Nelson's HMS Victory. It is also famous for hiding King Charles II on his retreat from the Battle of Worcester in 1651, an event still commemorated today by more than 500 pubs named The Royal Oak.

Well, what about a tree that I can identify? Field maple, Acer campestre, is one that I reliably get right. Also called the hedge maple because it is commonly found in hedges, this slow-growing tree gives soft yellow colour in autumn and bears red, winged, twinned seeds which helicopter down in the wind. It can live for 300 years, as opposed to the mighty oak's astonishing 900, but where the humble field maple exceeds the oak is

in its unrivalled use in the manufacture of stringed musical instruments.

The finest and most famous of all violins were made of its wood. Antonio Stradivari and Guiseppi Guarneri used it in their workshops in the Italian city of Cremona during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. The secret of the uniquely beautiful sound produced by their instruments has never been revealed, neither has it ever been equalled. It has been suggested that the cooler temperatures between 1640 and 1750 gave rise to more finely grained wood than that obtainable today, but who knows? These fabulously valuable instruments are usually loaned out to our most gifted professional violinists, because few people can afford to own one to play themselves. Cremona's craftsmen would be amazed by the longevity of their instruments, never imagining the unique quality of their field maples' "tonewood".
