

Harvest Festival

On 1st October the church was beautifully decorated by Tina Lane with produce from Anton and Liz Sparey – thanks to both.

We started the day with a said communion at 8.30am. Unfortunately Julia had covid and was unable to attend so Jen Jones took the service (her first since her ordination as a deacon) and we were lucky to have Sally Jones to perform the communion – thanks to both of them. At 11am the Harvest Festival service was taken by Jen Jones and Pete Thorp. Milada Tarka played the organ for us. We were invited to bring non-perishable items to be donated to the Tenbury Food Bank – at the end of the service the Food Bank box was full!

During the service Nabil Jamous, Chairman of the Trustees of Farmers Overseas Action Group (FOAG) explained their work in Uganda – Robin explained the FOAG Summer Appeal which is Send a Silo to Save a Harvest (this is an appeal to purchase steel silos to store their harvest - they are appealing for £133 which will part purchase a silo with the farmer in Uganda paying 40% to show their commitment. At the end of the service there was a collection for FOAG both on the plate and using FOAG's credit card machine. Several members of the congregation contributed the full £133 - thanks to them and overall FOAG received almost £400 in donations for the appeal. After the service people were asked to help themselves to the fruit and vegetables and leave a donation in the collection box.

Pilgrimage from Teme Valley South to the Isle of Iona

After two years of planning, nine intrepid pilgrims and our four canine companions headed north in September to find the remote island of Iona. Some had been before, but for most of us it was a venture into the unknown. We travelled in a few small groups, some stopping at Tebay services overnight to break the journey. For John and me, wild geese flew



overhead and glorious rainbows charted our route which took us nearly two days from Hanley. The weather was calm and mild and there were folks paddling in the gently lapping waters of Loch Lomond as we enjoyed a rest and a wander before heading to Oban to catch our car ferry across to Mull.

Our pilgrims' What'sApp group started pinging ferociously the next day as we all drew closer to the foot ferry at a very busy Fionnphort on Mull. Having separately navigated an hour and a half of single-track road across Mull, and blessed with continued balmy weather, we had already feasted on beautiful mountain and sea views. And so we met up with cases in tow, over 1400 years after St Columba and his Irish monks landed on Iona bringing Celtic Christianity to the island. Together we trundled onto the ferry ... we were a long way from our hop-filled valley of home, but excited for our time on Iona.

There was a bit of a Father Ted moment when one of our group realised that they could easily see Iona Abbey and the scattered settlement of dwellings across the water from Fionnphort. Exclaiming 'the Abbey is

smaller than I expected', our teasing response was '... that's because it's a long way away! It'll be bigger when we get closer to it'. Joking apart, the tiny island (three miles long by a mile wide) did not disappoint. The seas were aqua blue and clear and the atmosphere very special. As pilgrims we were on the island for three nights and stayed in a hotel just next to the Abbey. We ate breakfast and dinner together and as we relaxed in each other's company the conversation and laughter flowed easily.

We joined in community worship in the Abbey for morning prayer at 9am and their evening service at 9pm, where the worship was varied with powerful, meaningful and engaging language. The first night as we left the Abbey we could see the Milky Way clearly and there seemed to be three times as

many stars visible as back home. That night was also the first spectacular show of the aurora borealis of the autumn. Our day times were flexible but of-

fered two creative workshops in the wonderful community hall, a boat trip to Staffa, walks and an island pilgrimage. Most of the time the weather was good, but it poured with rain for the pilgrimage so we took shelter where we could and all ended up soaked. What's a pilgrimage without some hardship!

I shall always remember the wildlife, the landscape, the ecumenical community based in the Abbey and the inspiring singing there. Music seemed to flow out of the very rocks. My highlight however was sharing in communion with our group as I presided at the vast marble altar in the Abbey. Historic Scotland and the community

member who was sacristan couldn't have been more helpful. The sacristan was staying as part of the Abbey community for three months and home for her was the Blue Mountains just outside Sydney, a place I knew well from my time down under. As we chatted the miles melted away and we were two Christians sharing in the joy of being

in such a special place.

I'm left pondering. Why Iona? What is so special about that place? It is very hard to put into words



but is a combination of its history as the burial place of St Columba in 597CE and at least six Kings of Scotland. Also, the centuries of prayer and pilgrimage from across denominations, which contribute to it being without doubt a 'thin place' – a place where heaven seems to draw close to earth, where things seemed somehow less separated and disconnected. The quality and depth of rest I found there was immediate and that feeling has stayed with me. I think Iona's location as a liminal isle off the edge of a larger island contributes to its unique atmosphere which is important. As are the pristine waters and wonderful wildlife, including

dolphins, sea otters, whales, sea birds and corncrakes. Finally, the presence of the Iona Community, founded in 1938 by George MacLeod, makes a noticeable difference as they welcome pilgrims and visitors so completely. As we left on the Friday morning ferry, guests and members of the community were leaving too and those who stayed lined the jetty, waving goodbye with a series of Mexican waves. We all felt their warmth travelling through the air and sending everyone on their way with love.

I shall remember our pilgrimage for many years to come. We all left changed for ever; going as individuals and leaving as a group, having shared a unique experience. I look forward to seeing the fruit our Iona pilgrimage bears over the next few months and hope that we pilgrims can bring something of Iona to our lives here.

Climate change – how will it affect the UK?

As we saw in last month's TemeTalk, climate change due to human activity has already raised the average temperature of the planet by over 1 degree. As we will discuss next month, international efforts are under way to limit climate change by reducing our burning of fossil fuels. However, it seems likely that the temperature will continue to rise by at least a further degree. This is expected to have very serious consequences, especially in hot countries which may become virtually uninhabitable, but what impact is this likely to have on us here in the UK?

As an island with a rather mild, wet climate, the main direct impacts of climate change are expected to be from storms, excessive rainfall and sea level rise. Mean sea level around the UK has already risen over 15 cm since 1900 and this rise is accelerating due to melting of the Greenland and Antarctic icecaps and expansion of ocean water as its temperature rises. Assuming (rather optimistically) that global warming is held to 2 degrees, the plot on the right shows areas of England where homes are expected to be affected by coastal flooding by 2050. In total, around 200,000 homes could be lost. The process has already started - Happisburgh in Norfolk and Fairbourne in Gwynedd are being progressively evacuated as they fall into the sea. Many of the UK's great cities lie on river estuaries and will be threatened. London is protected by the Thames Barrier, which is raised when river water and high tides threaten to overtop embankments. The barrier is now closed about twice as often as when it was first constructed and will probably need to be replaced




by 2070.

River flooding is also expected to increase as the weather becomes increasingly stormy and unstable, and at the other extreme heatwaves and droughts will become more common and more extreme. Temperatures over 40 degrees were reached in the UK for the first time in 2022 and a record number of 30 wildfires were recorded.

Finally, the pressures caused by mass migration are sure to grow as climate change makes whole areas of the world inhospitable due to heat, drought and flooding. The UNHCR estimates that over 100 million people were displaced for the first time in 2022, and major international bodies have estimated that by 2050 there could be a billion people per year on the move.

Lest we forget

Paul and Cathie Tiffany live at The Lodge in Kyre; a house rich in history. From the late 19th century, it served as Kyre Post Office under its postmaster George Stead. George and Mary Stead's firstborn child, Emmeline, died in infancy and is buried in Kyre churchyard. They had four more children: Arthur, Gertrude, Richard and George.

When World War 1 broke out, Arthur was working in a reserved occupation on the railways. Richard, who had joined the Royal Welch Fusiliers in 1911, was already a lance corporal. George

joined the 9th Sherwood Foresters, Notts and Derby Regiment.

By early August 1915, Richard and George were dead. Richard was killed in the battle for La Neuve Chapelle on 26th October 1914, aged 26. He is buried at the Pont du Hem Cemetery in northern France. This battle was one of the very first engagements of the war. Richard would have fought alongside Indian troops to secure a frontline during the 'Race to the Sea'.

George was just 23 when he was killed on the 9th or 10th August 1915 at Suvla Bay, the Dardanelles. His body was never recovered but his name is recorded on The Helles Memorial.

In March of this year, Paul and Cathie visited Richard's grave, now a peaceful spot in an immaculately maintained Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery. Since moving to the Lodge,

they have felt a strong connection with the Stead family: standing in the spot where Richard is laid to rest was a particularly poignant experience.

George sent a postcard to his brother Arthur on 1st June 1915 from an army camp at Farnham, Surrey. He writes excitedly about marching past the King who was inspecting the troops before their departure for Turkey. George kept a diary right up until the day he was killed. His last entry reads: "Early morning my mate who generally made tea with me killed – bullet between the eyes." George's

matter-of-fact tone reveals how, after only a few weeks, he had become resigned to the likely outcome of his own situation.

In September Robert Stead, the grandson of Richard and George's older brother Arthur, visited The Lodge. He was researching his family history in the local area. Paul and Cathie were able to exchange information about the Stead family's connection with The Lodge. Welcoming a member of the Stead family to their home was a great privilege – a fitting tribute to the bravery of the two brothers.

A Remembrance Sunday service will be held in St Mary's Church, Kyre on Sunday 12th November at 10.50am. Richard and George's sacrifice is recorded on a memorial plaque inside the church and on the family tombstone by the gate.

Visiting parks and gardens is a great way to get some fresh air, enjoy open spaces and look out for wildlife. The National Open Garden Scheme promotes lots of local gardens, many of which also offer tea and cake, always a winning combination. I make sure to drop in at Tenbury Tourist Information Centre



early each year and pick up brochures for our three counties of Worcestershire, Shropshire and Herefordshire. Some communities operate outside the scheme and do their own advertising, so I keep an eye out for those too. I shall for ever be grateful to the people of St Michael's who threw open their gardens at the earliest opportunity after lock-down. I found it such a relief to return to normality and the day was made even more memorable by a flypast from the Red Arrows.

This year is no different and so far I have visited a Neen Sollars garden showcasing an arboretum planted up a vertiginous slope, a formal garden along the Ledwyche Brook hosting carpets of bluebells and gorgeous cherry blossom and an organic garden in Stoke Lacy decked in an extrav-

aganza of autumn colour. All the gardens worked with nature, all embraced water, either in ponds or streams, and all were home to insects and birds who busied themselves amongst the flowers and trees.

I also went to two larger sites, the National Trust's Croome Park and privately-owned

Spetchley Park. At Croome, the landscape of a formal estate is slowly being brought back to life after many decades of neglect. Capability Brown spent years advising on the huge groundworks that gave the Earl of Coventry rolling acres, a serpentine lake and eve-catching follies on distant hills. But what caught my eye was a host of dragonflies making the most of a sunny day on the water. It was particularly exciting to spot red-eyed damselflies, a species I hadn't seen before, and a huge number of ruddy darters. The latter are bright red and highly conspicuous against green vegetation. Also on the wing were azure damselflies and emperor and brown hawker dragonflies.

Spetchley gardens were different again. Here

a design enhanced by Ellen Willmott, a famous Edwardian designer, has an abundance of rare plants and trees. A deer park and large lake flank the formal garden with its greenhouses, walled garden and vine house. I was surprised to see a great variety of waterbirds on the lake. Geese, grebes,



coots, ducks, swans and swooping swallows all seemed to be getting along famously, ducking and diving into the calm expanse of water.

Despite passing the familiar brown tourist signs for Spetchley on many past occasions, I had failed to follow them during my nearly thirty years' residence in Worcestershire. However, I shall certainly visit again, especially since learning that it is home to a unique plant, the Spetchley daffodil. But I wasn't the only person to take my time to visit. In the tea-room I bumped into a neighbour who, like me, was enjoying a first visit there. Length of residence in the county? More than fifty years.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall on Thursday 10th November at 7.30pm. Our speakers will be Suzanne and Jake Tumnus whose talk is called "Mistletoe, the Facts and the Folklore". Everyone is most welcome, and it is just £2 on the door.




