

Dear Readers

22nd October sees the licensing of Julia to the Clifton group of villages in addition to the villages of Teme Valley South. Writing about this in last month's TemeTalk she tells of the birth of her second son which did not lessen her love for her first. Love, she reminds us, comes from God who is infinite.

All absolutely true. *But*, God who is infinite has created a finite world. There are only twenty four hours in a day and seven days in a week. So, as Julia wrote last month, "Routines may change...". What might that look like?

As long ago as the 1990s the author Andrew Bowden writing in *Ministry in the Countryside* describes every village having at its heart a "vicar shaped hole". Lack of vicars and lack of finance have resulted in clergy being stretched to cover more and more villages. The result can be clergy dashing round like headless chickens desperately trying to fill more and more holes. Or villages feeling that their "hole" is empty and God is absent. None of this brings glory to God!

What Bowden suggested is that the "vicar shaped hole" is filled by a team of people, ordained and lay, working together. It can be done. It needs a different kind of thinking from churchgoers who, a generation ago, had only a very limited role. It needs a different way of thinking from villagers to appreciate that just because it isn't the vicar who has visited/been at a social event or meeting/said prayers at/... that God's Church isn't absent. It needs vicars who see their role as enablers and encouragers of others.

So, in these changed times, what abilities might you have to offer to work with others for the glory of God?




Climate change - how does it work?

Climate change is in the news almost every day now. Of course fires, floods and droughts have always happened, but records are being broken all the time and climate scientists are in no doubt that this is due to the way that human activity is impacting on planet Earth. We are all contributing to this problem and we will all need to contribute to its solution. This is the first of four short articles in TemeTalk in which we look at climate change, the impact it is likely to have on us here at home and what needs to be done to avoid catastrophic future developments.

Our planet is warmed by the sun and cools by giving off infrared radiation. Its temperature is determined by the balance between these two effects. Carbon dioxide and other "greenhouse gases" in the atmosphere absorb a lot of the infrared radiation before it can escape, so that the Earth warms up. The glass in a greenhouse works in the same way – letting light in but absorbing infrared trying to get out. Hence the name "greenhouse effect" for the resultant warming.

Carbon dioxide is the main culprit. Its concentration in the atmosphere is actually very low (about 400 parts per million) but it has risen by nearly 50% since the industrial revolution, due pri-





marily to the burning of "fossil fuels" – coal, oil and natural gas. Unfortunately, a great deal of the quality of life we have all come to take for granted (warmth, food, travel and a wide variety of goods) have been underpinned by the energy we get from burning fossil fuels. So, as the population of the planet has risen and the standard of living has advanced in more and more countries, the rate at which we pump carbon dioxide into the air has risen too. The challenge now for mankind is to stop doing this, whilst still maintaining a decent quality of life for people on the planet.

The graph above shows how the average temperature of the planet has risen sharply since the industrial revolution. A rise of a degree or so might not sound like much, but we can already see the impact it is starting to have and of course this rise is nowhere near stopping. Predictions for the near future include extension of the Sahara desert up into Spain, sea level rise due to melting ice caps and much more extreme weather events affecting the whole world. In next month's issue we will look at how this is likely to affect us here in the UK.

Hallowe'en Pumpkin Cake

With Pumpkinfest in Eastham on 15th October, what better way to use up your pumpkin than this ghoulishly good Hallowe'en cake – a sweet treat that won't trick your guests!

Ingredients

For the cake

300g self-raising flour 300g light muscovado sugar 3 tsp mixed spice 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda 175g sultanas ½ tsp salt 4 eggs, beaten 200g butter, melted zest 1 orange 1 tbsp orange juice 500g (peeled weight) pumpkin or butternut squash flesh, grated

For drenching and frosting

200g pack soft cheese 85g butter, softened 100g icing sugar, sifted zest of 1 orange and juice of half

Method

Heat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4. Butter and line a 30 x 20cm baking or small roasting tin with baking parchment. Put the flour, sugar, spice, bicar-



bonate of soda, sultanas and salt into a large bowl and stir to combine.

Beat the eggs into the melted butter, stir in the orange zest and juice, then mix with the dry ingredients till combined. Stir in the pumpkin. Pour the batter into the tin and bake for 30 minutes, or until golden and springy to the touch.

To make the frosting, beat together the cheese, butter, icing sugar, orange zest and 1 tsp of the juice till smooth and creamy, then set aside in the fridge. When the cake is done, cool for 5 mins then turn it onto a cooling rack. Prick it all over with a skewer and drizzle with the rest of the orange juice while still warm. Leave to cool completely.

If you like, trim the edges of the cake. Give the frosting a quick beat to loosen, then, using a palette knife, spread over the top of the cake in peaks and swirls. If you're making the cake ahead, keep it in the fridge then take out as many pieces as you want 30 mins or so before serving. Will keep, covered, for up to 3 days in the fridge.

Support for school costs in the autumn

My children are starting new schools in September, one is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries. But there is help available.

A good place to start is the Citizens Advice website where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs.

The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support. The full list is available on the Citizens Advice website

https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from your Local Education Authority if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far. Your Local Education Authority is part of your local council that deals with education in your area, you can find yours on GOV.UK. Contact it directly to find out exactly what support it offers.

If you're on a low income, your Local Education Authority may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get means-tested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist.

A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with starting school costs and you're not alone. For more information Citizens Advice website.

Teme Valley Wildlife

If you set off on a ramble this month don't forget to look out for fungi, because late summer and early autumn are the times of year when many fungi send fruiting bodies up from their vast networks of unseen underground mycelia. Most of us are familiar with field mushrooms and with their larger parasol cousins. We may even have had our attention



drawn to more brightly coloured grassland waxcaps, but what about the curiously named earth star? Described as rare but widespread, these striking fungi can pop up in soil or sand-dunes across Britain. There are ten varieties of British earth star and I was lucky enough to find one of them here in the valley late in August.

Under the deep shade of conifer trees lining a lane adjacent to woodland, I spotted a group of small fungi which I knew I had never seen before. They formed a small colony, each in a different stage of development, and from their shape and size I suspected them to be earth stars. Being related to puffballs, it was easy to see that their round central bodies possessed an opening through which spores could be released. Each cen-



tral body was held on a star of five or more spreading rays. They looked like miniature sputniks and their ball-like centres have the capacity to shoot out clouds of smoke-like spores when triggered by falling raindrops or passing animals.

The variety I came across proved to be the fringed earth star, Geastrum sessile, sometimes called G fimbriatus. At a few centimetres in

diameter, its buff colour reminded the late great botanist Geoffrey Grigson of "a medlar lying rooted in the leafmould". He wrote that earth stars possessed an "oddly artificial look, they are not very common, and they are entirely useless." But he also said that to find them was "one of the rarest pleasures of searching woods in the autumn".

Although I had not encountered any type of earth star before, I had once seen a picture of one when my cousin, who is the groundsman of a municipal cemetery, found one growing in his patch. With the help of smartphone technology and the internet he had managed to identify and record this rarity. He enjoyed many fungi growing in his

jurisdiction and was dismayed to find commercial gatherers stripping his grass of mushrooms. Topend restaurants, who pay good money for such things, were, I thought, unlikely to advertise the fact that they had been "sustainably handpicked in your local graveyard" on their eco-friendly menus.

Actually, earth stars are not edible but their cousins, the giant puffballs, certainly are. Eaten at an early stage of development, well before reaching a potential 20 kg in weight, they are a healthy addition to a fried breakfast. Turn a slice in bacon fat and serve with bacon and fried eggs - delicious. But you'll have to give some to friends, they're too big to eat all by yourself.

The next meeting of the Teme Valley Wildlife Group will be at Stoke Bliss and Kyre Village Hall on Thursday 12th October at 7.30pm. Our speaker



is Shropshire Bat Group's excellent Phil Playford whose talk will, unsurprisingly, be about bats. Everyone is most welcome, and it is just £2 on the door.


